3. **Post-Delivery Check:** Incorporate specific mental health questions in post-delivery checkups.
4. **OASI Care Bundle:** Implement the Obstetric Anal Sphincter Injury (OASI) care bundle nationwide.
5. **Birth Reflections:** Roll out birth reflection services across the country.
6. **Education on Birth Choices:** Improve education on birth choices for expectant mothers.
7. **Respect Choices for Pain Relief:** Ensure respect and support for women's choices regarding pain relief.
8. **Support for Fathers:** Provide adequate support for fathers.
9. **Continuity of Care:** Digitise health records to ensure continuity of care.
10. **Legal Time Limit:** Extend the legal time limit for claims related to birth injuries.
11. **Address Inequalities:** Focus on reducing inequalities, particularly for ethnic minorities.
12. **Economic Impact Research:** Conduct research on the economic impacts of birth trauma.
